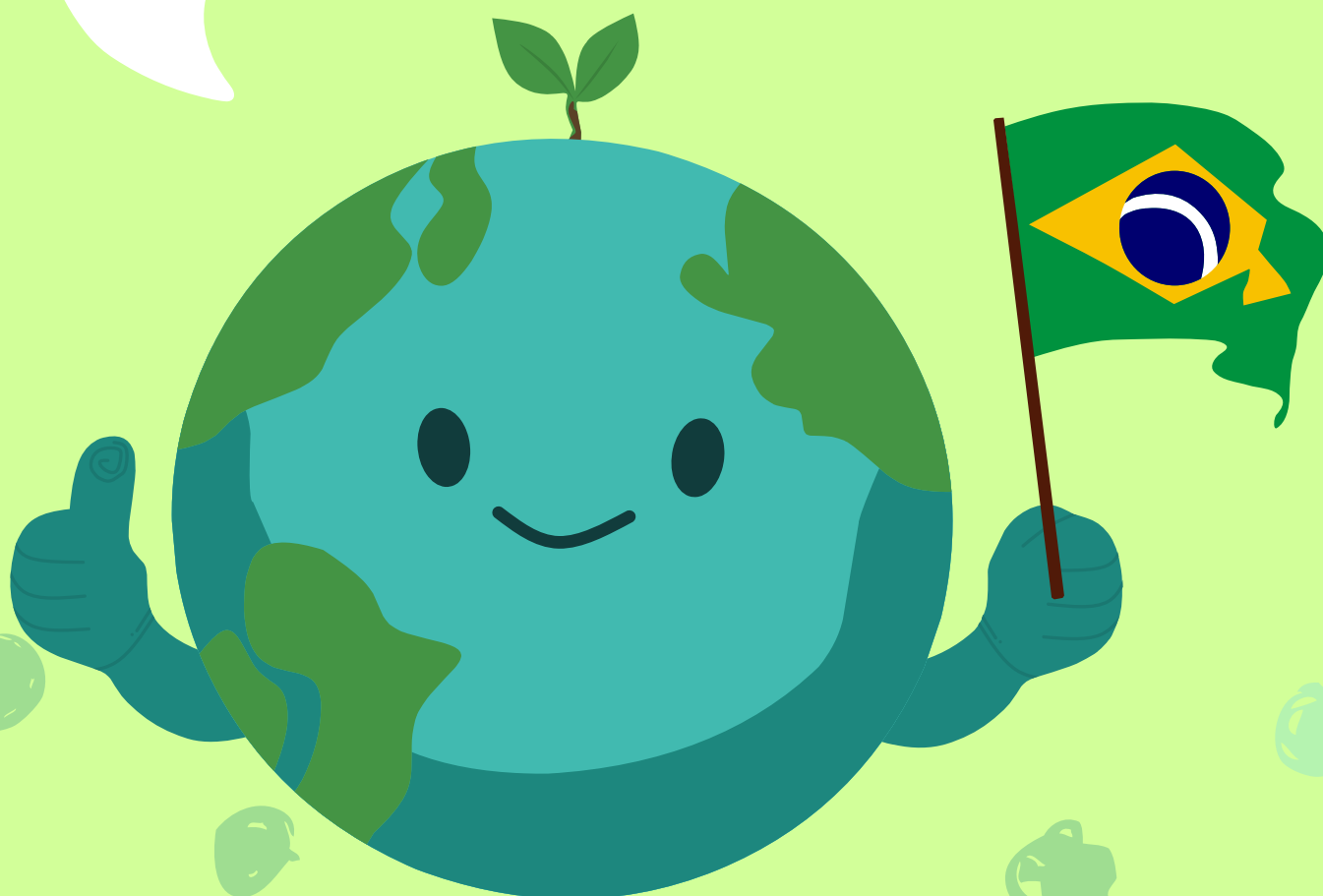

COP is an acronym for Conference of the Parties. The number 30 means it's the 30th time this meeting is happening. This meeting was created by the United Nations so that all countries participating in the Climate Change Convention can decide together how to protect Earth!

sea levels!

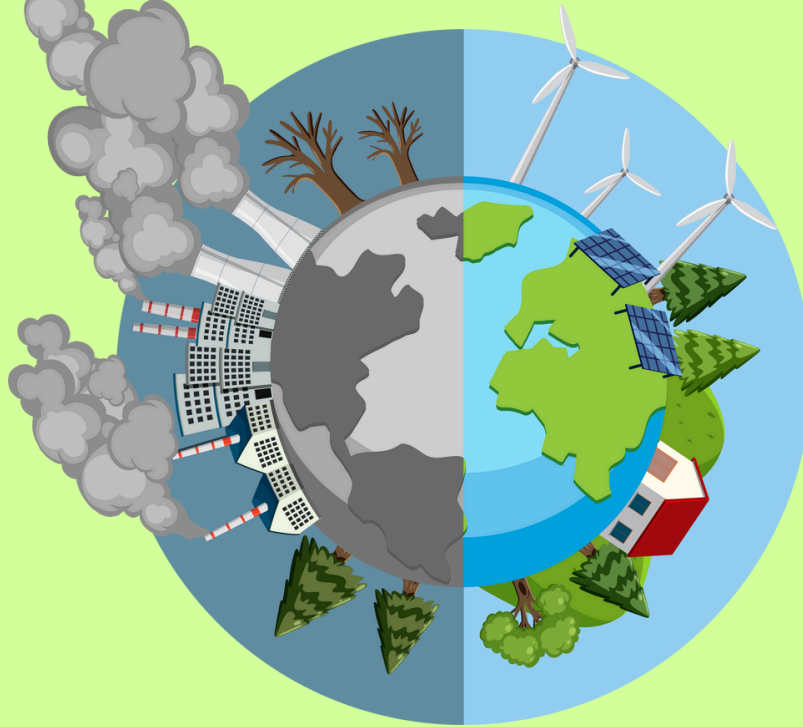


Because of all this,

Reducing greenhouse gases!



These gases come from cars, factories, and burn-offs, making Earth hotter. The idea is to reduce these gases and use clean energy, like solar and wind power!

Helping people adapt to climate change!



We need to find solutions to these questions!

How can we protect cities and crops when it rains too much or gets too hot?

How can we prevent rivers from drying up?

Funding environmental care!



Richer countries should help poorer ones
prepare for and protect themselves from
climate change.

Creating and using clean technologies!



Encourage the use of non-polluting machinery and equipment, like electric cars and solar panels.

Protecting waters, vegetation, and animals!



Prevent deforestation and take care
of animals, rivers, lakes, and seas.

Ensuring climate justice!



Protect people most affected by climate change, such as indigenous communities, fishermen, and residents of very hot regions or areas prone to flooding.




